Having been Organist of St Anne's with St Columba, Hoxton for ten years, he was appointed Organist & Choirmaster of St Margaret's, Lee in January 2006.

... is founder-conductor of the Giltspur Singers. His former conducting posts include the Cardiff Bay Singers and the Elizabethan Singers of London. Chris's compositions are performed on both sides of the Atlantic and, in his native Wales, have been featured in the Vale of Glamorgan and Macynlleth Festivals.
