The Giltspur Singers

...were formed in the autumn of 2003. They take their name from Giltspur Street, which leads up to the entrance of the church where they rehearse: St Bartholomew-the-Less, inside the grounds of St Bartholomew's Hospital in the City of London.

The choir performs mainly in and around London. Venues include St Mary's, Blackheath; Godalming Parish Church; St Giles-in-the-Fields; St Mary-le-Bow; St Dunstan's Stepney; the Chapel of Gray's Inn; St Mary's, Wimbledon; The Temple Church; St George's, Bloomsbury; St Mary's, Clapham; and St Vedast-alias-Foster. Repertoire ranges from medieval music to contemporary pieces; and the choir sings in several languages, including Latin, French, German and early forms of English.

The members of the choir are professionals in a wide range of careers, including the law, finance, education, medicine, the entertainment industry, P.R. and I.T. Some are music graduates; but, for the majority, music has always been a hobby. It is the sense of music as a source of recreation and enjoyment that the Giltspur Singers hope to share in their performances.

Duncan Atkinson: (Accompanist)

...was Head Chorister at Rochester Cathedral and later Organ Scholar at the University of Bristol. He was called to the Bar in 1995 and is a member of the Chambers of Roy Amlot QC and Junior Prosecution Counsel at the Central Criminal Court. Having been Organist of St Anne's with St Columba, Hoxton for ten years, he was appointed Organist & Choirmaster of St Margaret's, Lee in January 2006.

Dr Christopher Maxim (Conductor)

... is founder-conductor of the Giltspur Singers and also directs the St Teilo Singers, a peripatetic liturgical choir. Former conducting posts include the Cardiff Bay Singers and the Elizabethan Singers of London. Chris's compositions are published in the UK by Allegro Music, the Royal School of Church Music and Stainer & Bell; and in the USA by St James Music Press. His music is also available at www.sibeliusmusic.com. Pieces have been featured in the Vale of Glamorgan and Macynlleth Festivals (Wales), the Annual Festival of New Organ Music (London) and the Irish Recorder and Viol Course (Eire); and his music is performed a far afield as Germany, the USA and South Africa. The carol *All and Some*, included in tonight's concert, was published in May of this year by Allegro Music and is the musical insert in the latest edition of *Organists' Review*. Two new Christmas choral pieces are to receive their premières on Sunday, 20th December: *With Merry Heart* (St Matthew's, Bethnal Green: 4.00pm) and *The Jolly Shepherd* at (St Margaret's, Lee: 6.30pm). Chris is also published in the fields of musicology and music criticism. He is Organist of St Matthew's, Bethnal Green; and an Assistant Director of Bishop Challoner Catholic Collegiate School.
