The Giltspur Singers

...were formed in the autumn of 2003. They take their name from Giltspur Street, which leads up to the entrance of the church where they rehearse: St Bartholomew-the-Less, inside the grounds of St Bartholomew's Hospital in the City of London. The choir performs mainly in and around London. Repertoire ranges from medieval music to contemporary pieces and the choir sings in several languages, among them Latin, French, German and early forms of English. The members of the choir are professionals in a wide range of careers, including the law, finance, education, journalism, retail, the entertainment industry, P.R. and I.T. Some are music graduates but, for the majority, music has always been a hobby: a source of recreation and enjoyment that the Giltspur Singers hope to share in their performances.

Simon Daniels (Organ solo)

... read music at Edinburgh University and completed an MPhil at Birmingham. He originally trained as a trumpeter but, since 2006 has studied the organ with Anne Marsden Thomas. He has attained the CertRCO and is now working towards the ARCO diploma. Simon works in the Development Team at Historic Royal Palaces and conducts the staff choir, Palace Voices.

Christopher Goodwin (Baritone solo)

... is a distinguished lutenist, Secretary of The Lute Society and Editor of *Lute News*. He has given performances on BBC Radio 3 as singer and lutenist; and has recorded CDs with the soprano Jeni Melia. To date, Chris is the only contestant on *The Weakest Link* who, when booted off (unfairly, it should be pointed out), has sung a song about Ann Robinson, accompanying himself on the lute.

Nick Grounds (Tenor solo)

... was a chorister at St Paul's Cathedral and, as a bassoonist, won a scholarship to Cranleigh School in Surrey. He later read music with history at Leeds University. Always a keen sportsman, Nick is now working for Sky Sports News.

Dr Christopher Maxim (Conductor)

... is founder-conductor of the Giltspur Singers and also directs the St Teilo Singers, a peripatetic liturgical choir. Former conducting posts include the University of Bristol Church Choir, the Cardiff University Chamber Choir, the Cardiff University Church Choir, the Cardiff Bay Singers and the Elizabethan Singers of London. His compositions are published by Allegro Music, Recital Music, the Royal School of Church Music (St James Music Press in the USA), Stainer & Bell, and online at www.scoreexchange.com. His music is performed around the world and has been broadcast on BBC radio, recorded on CD, featured in festivals, and is on the diplomas syllabus of the London College of Music.
